PRESIDENT'S

MESSAGE Dr. Debra Munk President - MCPSRA

Dear Members:

Spring weather and increasing daylight are a welcome relief from the

gloom of the winter months.

In writing this message, I looked back at my last year's message. At that time, we were focusing on issues related to retiree benefits, including parity of coverage with active members, accurate calculations of the cost of retiree benefit plans, and premium holidays that were afforded to active members but not retirees. To

address these concerns several board members testified before the Board of Education in February 2024 and met with the Board President and Vice President to express our concerns and ask for an investigation into the health plan calculations.



A meeting with the MCPS auditor last
March, resulted in her investigating the issue and
issuing a report. As a result of her report, we received
assurances that discrepancies in benefit costs for
retirees and actives would be corrected moving
forward. There would be no more premium holidays for
actives or retirees. And we were promised that regular
meetings would be held with MCPSRA Board and MCPS
financial staff to ensure that promises are kept and we
are fully aware of any new developments, including the

result of negotiations. Finally, at a follow-up meeting with Superintendent Taylor, we were promised that our dental coverage now includes dental implants, and in FY26, hearing aids for pre-Medicare retirees would be covered. A lot has changed since my April 2024 message. MCPS is keeping its promises, and I am extremely proud of our work and the benefits we have assured for our members.

Consumer Education for April-May 2025 by Deb Berner

Happy spring! As the weather warms and summer approaches, flowers begin to bloom, and more people, animals—and unfortunately, scammers—are out and about. Below, you'll find important tips to keep in mind for travel planning, spring cleaning, and energy savings.

*Smart Travel Planning: Safe and Budget-Friendly Tips for Seniors

With warmer weather, many of us plan trips to visit family, enjoy a vacation, or explore new places. However, travel scams and unexpected expenses can turn a dream trip into a costly mistake.

- Book with Reputable Sources Use trusted travel agencies, airlines, and hotel websites. Be wary of deals that seem too good to be true.
- Avoid Travel Scams Watch out for fake vacation rental listings, unsolicited "free trip" offers, and high-pressure time-share sales. Always verify bookings directly.
- Know Your Travel Insurance Read the fine print on travel insurance policies. Ensure coverage includes medical emergencies, trip cancellations, and lost luggage.
- Be Aware of Hidden Fees Airlines and hotels may charge for baggage, seat selection, or resort fees. Review total costs before booking.
- Secure Important Documents Carry copies of passports, ID, and emergency contacts. Use a hotel safe for valuables.
- Stay Alert Online Avoid using public Wi-Fi for financial transactions or entering personal information while traveling.
- Watch for Senior Discounts Many airlines, hotels, and attractions offer discounts to seniors—ask before booking.

*Energy-Saving Tips for Warmer Months: Lower Bills & Avoid Scams As temperatures rise, so can energy bills. Here's how you can stay comfortable while keeping costs down:

- Use a Programmable Thermostat Setting the AC to adjust automatically can save money while maintaining comfort.
- Seal Drafts and Close Blinds Keeping blinds closed during the hottest part of the day and sealing gaps around doors/windows can help reduce cooling costs.
- Beware of Energy-Saving Scams Scammers may pose as utility companies, offering fake discounts or requesting payment in gift cards—always verify directly with your provider.
- Look for Legitimate Rebates Some energy companies offer rebates for installing energy-efficient appliances—check official websites, not unsolicited offers.
- Unplug Unused Devices Electronics and appliances still draw power even when off. Use power strips to switch off multiple devices easily.



• Service Your AC Unit – Regular maintenance helps improve efficiency and extends the life of your air conditioning system.

*Key points for Spring Cleaning Scams:

- Fake Cleaning & Repair Services Scammers may offer home cleaning, gutter repairs, or driveway sealing at low prices but take payment upfront and disappear. Always check credentials and reviews before hiring.
- Pressure Tactics for Unnecessary Work Be cautious of unsolicited workers claiming you need urgent repairs. Get multiple estimates and don't feel pressured to make quick decisions.
- Donation & Junk Removal Scams Fake charities may collect unwanted items or money for a "good cause." Verify organizations through sites like Charity Navigator before donating.
- Identity Theft Risks Shredding old documents is smart, but be wary of fake shredding services that may steal personal information. Use a reputable company or a home shredder.
- Phony Air Duct & HVAC Cleaners Some scammers exaggerate problems in your HVAC system to overcharge you. Always research companies and get a second opinion.
- Bogus Pest Control Services Fraudsters may offer fake extermination services, especially for termites. Verify licensing and get written agreements before paying.

MCPSRA 2026 Budget Notes

The budget as presented above is balanced between anticipated revenue (dues) and projected expenses. The total of \$30,000 has been reduced from \$34,500 to reflect actual revenues received in the past 2 years and actual expenses. The only changes in the budget are an increase of \$500 in funds for our Community Services projects and a decrease in matching funds for Interfaith Works to reflect actual experience in FY 24 and FY 25.
