What Are We Learning?

Math

Students have begun working on Module 4 which focuses on geometry. We will be exploring lines, line segments, rays, and angles as well as the relationships between them. Students will draw, identify and define these geometric objects before using their new knowledge and understanding to group figures and solve problems. Students will also learn how to create and solve equations to find unknown **angle measures**. Students will measure unknown angles by both using a protractor and reasoning through the solving of an equation.

Math 4/5

Students in Math 4/5 are working on the second half of Grade 5 Module 2, focusing on multi-digit multiplication and division with whole numbers and decimals. They are building on place value understanding to use efficient strategies, estimate for reasonableness, and solve multi-step word problems. Recently, students have shifted from multiplication to division, using models and strategies to divide multi-digit numbers and decimals with confidence.

CKLA Reading & Writing

Students will be starting Unit 7 where students will examine the sequence of events leading to the American Revolution and what happened during the war itself. Students will also read two literary selections about the time period. Students will review the stages of the writing process and engage in an extended writing project. These activities will lead to the development of a five-paragraph cause and effect essay.

Social Studies

In Unit 4, students are using social studies literacy and thinking skills to learn about the progression of the American Revolution, from causes to the birth of an independent nation. Students will identify major events leading to the American Revolution and explain opposing perspectives of those in support of and against the war. They will also explain the purpose of the Declaration of Independence and describe the new nation's first attempt at establishing a central government.
