Medical Science with Clinical Applications- Sherwood High School Medical Careers- Magruder High School

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GOAL: The Medical Careers Program is a community based program that provides students opportunities to gain knowledge and firsthand experience in careers within the health care industry. The goal of the program is to prepare students for both immediate employment and post-secondary education within a chosen medical career.

CONTENT: Medical Careers is a science and career development credited program that offers students unique medical learning opportunities. The program's broad based explorations of the health care field enables students to make informed career decisions. During the first semester students learn anatomy, physiology, disease processes and medical terminology. Students also learn to perform a variety of patient care skills. Second semester begins with the students mastering the skills associated with basic life support. Students then put their knowledge and skills into practice at a Friends Nursing Home and MedStar Montgomery Medical Center. Upon successful completion of the program, students may be eligible for certification within the State of Maryland as a nursing assistant.

Prerequisites: Completed Chemistry A/B or Biology A/B with a grade of B or better Cumulative GPA of 2.5 AND Foundations of Health and Medicine AND Structures and Functions.

Co-requisite: Concurrent enrollment in Biology A/B or Chemistry A/B or a higher level science AND Structures and Functions

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS: A variety of instructional methods will be used including, but not limited to, lecture, discussion, direct student response, videos, role-playing, student self-learning activities, and clinical lab participation.

EVALUATION: Grades will reflect individual mastery of concepts and skills based on the course content. A variety of evaluation methods will be used. Marking period grade determinations will be distributed to students at the beginning of each marking period.

HOMEWORK POLICY: Homework will be posted weekly on Edline. The majority of assignments will be to read and outline a selection from the text. Most of these assignments will be followed by an open note quiz that will count as a formative grade.

ATTENDANCE POLICY: Students must be present for 95% of classes during 1st semester in order to continue on to 2nd semester. Tardiness greater than 15 minutes will be considered as an absence.

RETEACHING & REASSESSMENT: Reteaching will occur when the teacher or students determine that students are not meeting learning goals. If an assignment is determined to be reassessable, all students will be eligible for reassessment. Scores earned on a reassessment will REPLACE the original score. Assessments that indicate a final measure of learning will not be eligible for reassessment.

COMMUNICATION: Assignments and grades will be posted on Edline. Parents and students are strongly encouraged to check this and are welcomed to discuss grades with the instructor at any time either in person, via email or phone.
